This interdisciplinary workshop will be attended by academics and policy makers with expertise across health systems and primary health care. While some experts will be presenting, others will chair sessions and lead group discussions. This workshop is also suitable for emerging researchers wanting to develop networks for research in primary health care and health systems and experienced researchers broadening into these areas.

The objectives of the workshop will be:

1. To receive an update on the Astana Declaration on Primary Health Care
2. To define terms, and explore current thinking about the public health/public health care nexus, Universal Health Care (UHC), Health for All (HFA) and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and outline an appropriate research direction to optimise the opportunity that WUN offers to contribute to gaps in research globally.
3. To understand the areas of opportunity to work on measures for potential comparison between systems and continents.
4. To develop a strategy for higher education institutions (at least WUN members) to influence health systems towards Health for All.
